2. Housing: All summer quarter students should file an application for housing separate from the fall quarter application. Contact Mr. John Lovern, Director of Housing, Oxford College, Oxford, Ga. 30267.
3. Entering Freshmen: If you intend to begin your college career during summer quarter, so indicate on your application or write to Dr. Andrew Pate, Director of Admissions, Oxford College, Oxford, Ga. 30267 (404-786-7051). First quarter freshmen should plan to arrive at the college in time to meet their faculty advisor in the Student Center, Sunday, June 22, 2:00 p.m. At that time your faculty advisor will assist you with course selection and other orientation matters.
4. Transient and Transfer Students: A transient or transfer student should make application to the college by contacting the Director of Admissions. A transient student should request the appropriate official of his degree-granting institution to send written approval
of the courses to be taken to the Director of Admissions of Oxford College.

A transient or transfer student should report to the Registrar's Office on Monday, June 23, 9:00 a.m.
5. Oxford College Students: A presently enrolled student should register for summer quarter at Oxford during spring quarter, May 12-16. However, registration for summer may continue until opening of the quarter.


## SPECIAL FRESHMEN PROGRAM BIOLOGY INSTITUTE:

A special program has been designed for all entering freshmen who wish to strengthen their academic preparation. The program is particularly helpful for pre-medical, dental and nursing aspirants. A participant in this program would take English 104: Rhetoric and Composition; Mathematics 101: Trigonometry and Algebra (PreCalculus), and Chemistry 100: Introductory Chemistry.

English 104 should improve the grammar and writing skills necessary for college level work. Chemistry 100 should be taken by those who have not had chemistry in high school or whose preparation is weak. Math 101 should be taken by those who have had only two years of high school math and have not had trigonometry, or whose preparation is weak.

Taking this special program in the summer quarter permits students to receive greater personal attention than usual and to establish a more competitive foundation.

Biology 101-105
Dr. Homer Sharp
A student may take Biology 101 and 105 during an eight week summer institute. Biology 101 is an introductory course and may be taken by a first quarter student; Biology 105 may be taken subsequent to Biology 101. The institute is primarily designed for students who wish to concentrate in biology or in the biomedical sciences. Participants accelerate their college work and/or make their regular school year schedules more flexible. First quarter freshmen participants are strongly urged to take no additional courses except physical education.

## ORGANIC CHEMISTRY INSTITUTE: <br> Chemistry 121-122

Chemistry 121 and 122 are offered as an institute for premedical and pre-dental students who desire to complete the two courses in eight weeks. Many students find the concentrated study of organic chemistry facilitates their learning. The class meets for eight hours of lecture and six hours of laboratory per week. Additional study sessions are held in which the class participates in learning activities directed by the instructor. Prerequisite: Chemistry 102.

## SOCIAL SCIENCE SEMINAR

Ms. Maxine Atkinson, Dr. Neil Penn, Dr. Hoyt Oliver

Perspective on society and insights into personhood-a multi-dimensioned pattern of social science studies designed to develop a coherent picture of society in concentrated summer work. Open to both freshmen and sophomores. There are six courses offered as parts of the social science seminar.
a. Two courses will meet for one hour daily during the full eight week term: Political Science 120: National Politics in the U.S.; History 255: The South in American History (Penn).
b. Two courses will meet for four hours on each of two afternoons during the first four week term: Psychology 100: Introductory General Psychology (Oliver); Sociology 101: Introduction to Sociology (Atkinson).
c. Two advanced caurses will meet for four hours on each of two afternoons during the second four-week term: Psychology 209: Psychology of Adolescence (Oliver, prerequisite-Psychology 100 or 101); Sociology 213: Sociology of the Family (Atkinson, prerequisite-Sociology 101).
Colloquia, speakers and special events will be shared by all participants in the seminar throughout the summer Students may take as many as four courses, for twenty hours credit (this is not an overload), during the eight week summer quarter. However, it is suggested that entering freshmen take no more than fifteen hours (3
courses)-one eight week course, one four week afternoon course, and its afternoon sequel during the second four weeks.

## LANGUAGE INSTITUTE FRENCH

Entering students who have less than two years of a foreign language in high school are required to complete a foreign language at the 103 level at Oxford College ( 1 year). To facilitate the completion of this requirement the college offers, in its summer quarter, a language institute designed to allow students to complete the equivalent of one year of language study. Attendance at the institute may be particularly important for preprofessional students whose curriculum is highly structured.
