General Information

Application Procedures. All new students who plan to attend the summer quarter at Oxford should complete and mail the form in this brochure or write to the Director of Admissions, Oxford College, Oxford, GA 30267. Students presently enrolled should register for summer quarter during spring quarter preregistration, May 7-11.

Special Freshman Program

A special program has been designed for all entering freshmen who wish to strengthen their academic preparation. The Special Freshman Program, offered in the summer quarter, provides students the opportunity for greater personal attention and helps to establish a more competitive foundation. The program is particularly helpful for medical, dental and nursing aspirants and for those who need to improve their English and math skills. Students may take any or all of the following courses as their needs dictate.

English 100. Fundamentals of English. Designed to improve the grammar and writing skills necessary for college-level work.

Chemistry 100. Introductory Chemistry. Should be taken by those who have not had chemistry in high school or whose preparation is weak.

Mathematics 101. Trigonometry and Algebra. A pre-calculus course for those who have had only two years of high school algebra and no trigonometry or who lack preparation of calculus.

Mathematics 99. Algebra Review. A non-credit course for students who have not had two years of high school algebra. Designed to prepare students to take Mathematics 101.

The *Study Skills Clinic* at Oxford College has two primary goals: (1) to improve academic performance systematically through assessment and improvement of study behavior, and (2) to help students gain confidence and satisfaction from improved academic performance.

Four special courses have been scheduled in Oxford's summer program in connection with the theatre production.

ENGLISH 289A. Drama and Religion. Exploration of the relationship between religion and theatre/drama. Readings from works with overtly religious content and others which lend themselves to examination in perspective of their religious meaning.

ENGLISH 289B. Theatre Conventions, Problems and Practices. Examination of the evolution of the stage and its equipment, acting, and the conventions of various historical and modern theatres.

PHILOSOPHY 130. Philosophy of Religion. An introduction to the philosophy of religion. The philosophical investigation of religion and religions as human phenomena; exploration of the classical problems of religious expression and of the relation of religion to science, ethics, and art.

SOCIOLOGY 289. Sociology of Religion. Religion as dimension of human behavior in personal, social and cultural systems. Origins, structure and functions of religious institutions and their role in the maintenance and change of social systems. Emphasis on the religious response to problems of ultimate meaning in various societies, including the United States.

Interim Courses

Two courses have been designed to provide students with the opportunity to combine study with travel during the summer quarter.

English 268S will be offered during the first term in which students will study selected works of Georgia writers and will visit locations reflected in these writings. The writers to be studied include O'Connor, Aiken, Dickey, Lanier, McCullers, Harris, Longstreet, Caldwell, and Mitchell. Trips are planned to Savannah, Columbus, Atlanta, Eatonton, Waynesboro, and the Chatoga River. Schedule for study sessions and travel will be announced at a later date. Expenses in addition to tuition will be approximately \$150. Those interested in this course should contact Prof. John Gregory.

Geology 104 S will be offered during the last term from July 31 to August 13. This course is designed to give an appreciation of the geology which may be observed while traveling throughout the Southeast. Coastal processes, weathering and erosion, stratigraphy, tectonics, and geologic history of the area will be studied through classroom work and travel to the coast and mountains. Proposed excursions are to Jekyll Island and/or Cumberland Island, Stone Mountain and Cloudland Canyon. Also students will pan for gold near Dahlenega and explore caverns in Tennessee. Expenses in addition to tuition will be \$150. Those interested in this course should contact Prof. Bill Boyd.



Institutes

Biology 101 and 105. This nine week summer institute is designed primarily for students who wish to concentrate in biology or in the biochemical sciences. Participants accelerate their college work and/or make their regular school year more flexible. First quarter freshmen participants are strongly urged to take no additional courses except physical education.

Chemistry 121 and 122 are offered as an institute for pre-medical and pre-dental students who desire to complete the two courses in nine weeks. Many students find the concentrated study in organic chemistry facilitates their learning. The class meets for eight hours of lecture and six hours of laboratory per week. Additional study sessions are held in which the class participates in learning activities directed by the instructor.
